February was an introduction to Rag Rugging by Sam Osborne which was very popular and saw many guests joining us for the evening.

Around 40 members and guests attended and a big Thank You was given to Di Caesar for use of the wood and also the fire and marshmallows, which added to the great atmosphere. Everyone had the opportunity to hold the birds which was very special.

In July, the committee arranged a private Tapas Taster evening at The Old Badger in Eastington. The landlady was very accommodating, doing a special menu for us at £9 per head, the members paying £5 and our funds covering the balance. A good night was had by all.

August saw Debbie from Debbie and Jilly's Lingerie giving us some tips on what to wear to make the most of our figures – whatever shape – and how to wear it. This even included our underwear! An interesting and fun night.

We also helped with the Slimbridge Horse Show, providing the judges lunches. This was our second fund raiser of the year and went off well with lots of compliments on our menu and the cakes provided by members. A donation was given by the Horse Show committee towards our expenses for 2015.

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Our September meeting saw Godsells Cheeses from Leonard Stanley give us a talk and taster session on the very different cheeses they make locally. Added to this was an open night for family and friends with wine and bread.

I am Sue and I took the position of Treasurer from Chrissy a year ago with a starting balance of £1702. And finished with a total as at 1<sup>st</sup> October of 1433.72 PC 35.85 £1470

Total Income £2126.14 and Exp £2576.76

We've had 22 Members during 2014 bringing a income of £329 (after fees to GFWI). Thers been a large number of Guests with an income of £254, the only other form of income was the Quiz which with the raffle raised a total of £345 these being our only form of increasing funds. We took part in the horse show and we initially were given a cheque to cover expenses. But have since been advised that we are getting £150 for funds which is down on previous years and will not show up in this years accounts.

Our main form of expenses are the speakers which totals £618 and of course the next is the Hall Hire £232 which this year has increased by £2 per session. We have also bought items such as tablecloths, wine glasses and baskets and other odds and ends for when we are catering for events And with refreshments for meeting which has included wine, and with the leaflet drop printing and expenses etc. We have spent more than we have had income of about £450. As long as we keep to around £1000 at any one time then we are holding our own but we would love to see more members and guests. From our Guests that have been coming regularly we have signed up 6 of these so hopefully all existing members will rejoin again - which rings me nicely to tell you that MB is due either this month/ Dec but before end of year at a cost of £36 The Committee hope that will have a good 2015 for membership they have worked hard to make a full program for 2015 and we all hope that you all enjoy and have a great new year.
